

Evaluation of effectiveness of Home Group Fellowships at Nairobi Baptist Church

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this research was to evaluate the effectiveness of Home Group Fellowships and their challenges at Nairobi Baptist Church. The study was conducted at Nairobi Baptist Church and the target population was the congregants.

The research was carried out through a questionnaire. The questionnaires were given to the congregants on a particular Sunday in the month of June. A good number of the questionnaires were returned dully filled by the target participants. The data analysis was done by using the Statistical Package for Social Scientists (SPSS) and results are presented in tables, figures and graphs.

The data was statistically treated, using descriptive statistics based on percentage scores. For analysis, the figures are provided for total and by sub-groups, principally based on gender and age of congregation, although only for selected questions.

The findings obtained from the research showed that majority of Nairobi Baptist Church congregants are non-participants in Home Group Fellowships, due to various reasons and specifically the youth, young adults and men.

The research has made key recommendations for the interests of the congregants and the leadership of the Nairobi Baptist Church as an organization. There is need to create more awareness and to emphasize the role of the HGFs to the congregants and also deliberate efforts to mobilize more congregants not only in HGFs but in other ministries too.
